
## Sigma Pi Blood Drive a

On Thursday, Oct. 11, Sigma Pi Fraternity sponsored an American Red Cross blood drive in Anacon Hall from 11 a.m. until 5 p.m. The blood drive drew over 135 applicants, each donating one pint of blood.

A registration table was set up at the door to Anacon, where students Monmouth community members registered to give blood, and received preliminary information sheets. Applicants were then directed to a seating area, where they filled out paperwork regarding their health, as well as donor information. Health workers next called participants to individual cubicles for a ten-minute consultation, in which a drop of blood was taken from each person's finger and tested for iron. Temperature and blood pressure were also measured to ensure that each person was fit to give blood.

After applicants were cleared to donate, they were sent to one of many hospital gurneys set up near Anacon's ceiling-high windows. The stretchers were arranged in groups of four, with one staff member for every two beds. The actual donation process lasted between eight and 12 minutes, depending on the speed of each individual's blood flow.

Following blood donations, student volunteers ushered donors over to several tables and chairs, where they were required to rest for at least five minutes after donating. Bags of pretzels and cookies were provided, as well as cans of apple and orange Additional student juice. volunteers walked from table to table to ensure that donors did not experience any complications, such as dizziness or nausea.

"I didn't fill a whole bag [with blood]," explained Espirit Smith, a communication and English major. "They took [the needle] out because my eyes started to
